OUR CLASSROOM BUZZ...

KINDREGARTEN and GRADE 1: This is a busy time of year. We took our first field trip to Stonewall Farm last Friday. We are learning about plants and animals on the farm. In June, Clare Green has generously agreed to a walking trip to her house for a special end of the year activity visiting her fairy houses, exploring pond life, walking her labyrinth and doing storytelling and a picnic. It should be great fun!



Our next units in science and social studies are: landforms and maps, plants, ways to take care of the earth.

We have several end of year projects in the works. We will be creating our bottle-cap mosaic. Thank you to Dan Dibble for donating and framing a piece of wood to be the base of the project. (wow! It is beautiful!) We have collected many, many bottle caps and will be excited to see how our mosaic turns out. The children have really loved learning about Spain and the architect, Antoni Gaudi, through my sharing my summer trip.



READER'S CORNER: DON'T LET THE BOOKS GET DUSTY!

Periodically, I remind students to look after their library books. It can be a source of stress when children have difficulty locating their books or return books damaged. Although students do take responsibility for the care of their books,

some students (especially younger ones) need help: perhaps finding one safe spot to keep their book, and periodic reminders to keep books off the dinner table, and away from pets and younger siblings is very helpful! I offer students the choice to keep their books in the classroom if they find this hard to manage.

SPRING FASHION is blooming at WCS! Just a few reminders about our dress code, designed with fun, safety, and respect in mind. Sneakers are always the best choice for footwear. They offer good grip and ankle support and are safe for running games, jump-rope, kickball. Flip-flops, slides and high-heels are not safe on the playground and not allowed in school. Midriffs must be covered.

Spaghetti straps, revealing necklines or "belly" shirts are not allowed. Shirts with inappropriate wording or graphics must stay home. Hats may be worn at recess.



HEALTH NOTES: Tick Tips!

- Deer ticks (adults and nymphs) may carry Lyme disease, babesiosis and ehrlichiosis. American dog ticks have not been shown to carry these diseases, but they may carry tularemia and Rocky Mountain spotted fever.
- Wear repellent containing at least 20% DEET or permethrin-treated clothing. Additional repellent options are available.
- ❖ Ticks are found generally found near the ground, in brushy or wooded areas. They can't jump or fly. Instead, they climb tall grasses or shrubs and wait for a potential host to brush against them.
- They may be active during any month, but late spring to early summer, and fall are seasons of high risk.
- Be sure to do a tick check every day. Take a shower as soon as you can after working/playing outdoors.
- ❖ Ticks may be seen readily on light colored clothing. Ticks can hide under the arms, in and around the ears, inside the belly button, behind the knees, between the legs, around the waist, and on the hairline and scalp.
- Remove embedded ticks promptly. Grasp the tick at the point of entry and pull back steadily, using tweezers. Avoid squeezing the body. Then, swab the site with an antiseptic.

Note: Avoid folklore remedies such as "painting" the tick with nail polish or petroleum jelly, or using heat to make the tick detach from the skin.

See a doctor if you develop a fever, a rash, severe fatigue, facial paralysis, or joint pain within 30 days of being bitten by a tick. Be sure to tell your doctor about your tick bite.
